

The sheet bend knot is used to tie a rope to a larger rope or object. It is a strong, secure knot that is easy to tie and untie.








1 Make a loop and bring the junction point to the left of the thick central rope

- 2 Now pass it to the right side through the loop just formed




3 Turn it round the central rope thrice



- 4 Finally, take it out of the last loop formed passing it to the left



5 Tighten the knot

Bowline Knot



Form a tail loop by going through the eye of the desired loop knot.



Form a small loop by going through the eye of the tail loop.



Pass the end of the tail through the small loop.



Pass the end of the tail through the large loop.




Continue around the standing part and back through the small loop.



Tighten the rope and knot the bight.

11. Rolling Hitch Knot




12. Constrictor Knot


Tying a Double Constrictor Knot




- ① Take the working end round the standing part



- ② Make one more turn round the object




- ③ Tuck under the first wrap






